# Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

# **Opinion**

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Spice Money Limited ("the Company"), which comprise the Balance Sheet as at March 31, 2020, the Statement of Profit and Loss including Other Comprehensive Income, Statement of Change in Equity, the Cash Flow Statement for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information (hereinafter referred to as "the financial statements").

In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the aforesaid financial statements give the information required by the Companies Act, 2013 ("the Act") in the manner so required and give a true and fair view in conformity with the accounting principles generally accepted in India, of the state of affairs of the Company as at March 31, 2020, its profit including other comprehensive income, the changes in equity and its cash flows for the year ended on that date.

# **Basis for Opinion**

We conducted our audit of the financial statements in accordance with the Standards on Auditing (SAs), as specified under section 143(10) of the Act. Our responsibilities under those Standards are further described in the 'Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements' section of our report. We are independent of the Company in accordance with the 'Code of Ethics' issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India together with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements under the provisions of the Act and the Rules thereunder, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements and the Code of Ethics. 

The Board of Directors are also responsible for overseeing the Company's financial reporting process.




# Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

- (i) a. The Company has maintained proper records showing full particulars, including quantitative details and situation of Property, Plant & Equipment.
  - b. The Company has physically verified its property, plant and equipment during the year except payment devices installed at the site of agents and distributers. No material discrepancies were noted wherever physical verification was done. In our opinion physical verification of payment devices installed at the site of agents and distributors should also be physically verified annually.
    - c. As per records of the Company, the Company did not hold any immovable property as at March 31, 2020. Therefore, provisions of clause 3(i) (c) of the Order are not applicable to the Company.
- (ii) The management has conducted physical verification of inventories during the year at reasonable interval and no material discrepancies were noticed on such physical verification.
- (iii) The Company has granted unsecured loans to a company covered in the register maintained under Section 189 of the Companies Act, 2013. The terms and conditions of the grant of such loans are not, prima facie prejudicial to the interest of the Company. Repayment of principal was regular as stipulated, but Interest of Rs. 19.61 Lakhs were outstanding for more 90 days as on March 31, 2020 which has since received. The Company has not granted any loan to Firms, Limited Liability Partnership or any other parties covered in the register maintained under section 189 of the Companies Act, 2013.
- (iv) The Company has complied with provisions of Section 186 of the Companies Act, 2013 in respect of loan granted during the year. According to information and explanations given by the management and based on audit procedure performed by us, there is no loan granted or guarantee or security provided under section 185 of the Companies Act, 2013 and no investment made, guarantee given or security provided under section 186 of the Companies Act, 2013 during the year.
- (v) According to information and explanations given by the management and based on audit procedure performed by us, the Company has not accepted any deposit covered under sections 73 to 76 of the Companies Act, 2013 during the year. Therefore, provisions of clause 3(v) of the Order are not applicable to the Company.

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(vi) The maintenance of cost records prescribed under the section 148 (1) of the Act read with Companies (Cost Records and Audit) Rules, 2014 was not applicable on the Company. Therefore, provisions of clause 3(vi) of the Order are not applicable to the Company.

- (vii) a. According to the records of the Company, the Company is generally regular in depositing undisputed statutory dues including provident fund, employees' state insurance, income-tax, goods and service tax, sales tax, service tax, duty of customs, duty of excise, value added tax, cess and other material statutory dues deducted/ accrued in the books, with the appropriate authorities. - (ix) During the year, the Company did not raise any money by way of initial public offer or further public offer (including debt instruments). The Company has not raised any term loan during the year. Therefore, provisions of clause 3(ix) of the Order are not applicable to the Company.
- (x) Based upon the audit procedures performed for the purpose of reporting the true and fair view of the financial statements and according to the information and explanations given to us, no fraud by the Company or no fraud on the Company by its officers and employees has been noticed or reported during the year.



#### L Corporate information

Spice Money Limited(Formerly known Spice Digital Limited) ("the Company") is a public Company domiciled in India and is incorporated under the provisions of the Companies Act applicable in India and having registered office at 622, 6th Floor, DLF Tower, Jasola District centre, New Delhi - 110025.

Space Money is one of India's largest tech-enabled Hyper Local Payments Network offering various services like Cash Deposit, Cash Withdrawal, Balance Inquiry, Bill Payments, Aadhaan Enabled Services, Air Time Recharge, POS Services, Railway Ticketing Services etc. through its authorized agents.

The financial Statioents are authorized for issue by Board of Directors of Company at the meeting held on June 24, 2020.

#### 2. Significant accounting policies

#### 2.1 Status of Compliance:-

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Indian Accounting Standards (hereinafter referred to as the 1nd AS') as notified by Ministry of Cooperate Affairs pursuant to Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 3 of the Companies (Indian Accountine Standards) Rules, 2015 as amended

#### 2.2 Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis, except for certain financial assets and habilities which have been measured at fair value (refer accounting policy regarding financial instruments). These financial statements have been prepared on accrual and going concern basis. The accounting policies are applied consistently in all periods presented in the financial statements.

The financial statements are presented in Rs. Lakhs and all values are rounded upto two decimal places, except when otherwise indicated

#### 2.3 Functional and Presentation Corrency

The financial statements are presented in Indian Rupees, which is the functional currency of the Company and the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Company operates.

#### 2.4 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

#### A. Current versus non-current classification

The Company presents assets and liabilities in the balance sheet based on current/non-current classification. An asset is treated as current when it is.

- b. Held primarily for the purpose of trading;
- c. Expected to be realised within twelve months after the reporting period; or
- d. Cash or eash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period

All other assets are classified as non-current

A hability is current when,

- a. It is expected to be settled in normal operating cycle;

- e. It is due to be settled within twelve months after the reporting period; or
- 3. There is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period
- The Company classifies all other habilities as non-current

Deferred tax assets and habilities are classified as non-current assets and habilities.

The operating cycle is the time between the acquisition of assets for processing and their realisation in cash and eash equivalents. The Company has identified twelve months as its operating cycle.

#### B. Fair value measurement

The Company measures financial instruments, such as, investments at fair value at each balance sheet date

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The fair value measurement is based on the presumption that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer the liability takes place either

In the principal market for the asset or liability; or

ii. In the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market for the asset or liability.

The principal or the most advantageous market must be accessible by the Company.

The fair value of an asset or a liability is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or hability assuming that market participants and in their economic best interest.

The Company uses valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimising the use of unobservable inputs

External valuers are involved for valuation of significant assets, such as properties and inquoted financial assets, and significant habilities

All assets and liabilities for which fair value is measured or disclosed in the financial statements are categorised within the fair value hierarchy, described as follows, based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole

Level I ---- Quoted (unadjusted) market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities

Level 2 --- Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is directly or indirectly observable

Lycel 3 --- Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is unobservable

C. Revenue recognition

#### Safe of goods

#### Income from sérvices

Revenue from fintech services such as domestic money transfer (DMT), AEPS, BBPS, Top-up recharges etc. are recognized when the services are actually rendered on real time birsts

Interest income is recognized on a time proportion basis taking into account the amount outstanding and the applicable interest rate. Interest income is included index the head indirect income" in the statement of profit and loss.

#### Dividends

Dividend income is recognised when the company's right to receive dividend is established.

Goods and service (ax (GST) on above, whenever applicable, is not received by the Company on its own account. Rather, it is rax collected on value added to the commodity by the seller on behalf of the government. Accordingly, it is excluded from revenue.

#### Current Taxes



### 4).Fair value hierarchy

### 42. Financial risk management objectives and policies

The Company's principal financial liabilities, comprise borrowings, trade and other payables. The main purpose of these financial liabilities is to finance and support the operations of the Company. The Company's principal financial assets include trade receivables, cash and cash equivalents, bank balances, loans and other financial assets that derive directly from its operations. The Company also holds FVTPL investments and investment in subsidiary companies measured at cost

The Company is exposed to market risk, credit risk and liquidity risk. The Company's senior management advises on financial risks and the appropriate financial risk governance framework. The senior management provides assurance that the Company's financial risk activities are governed by appropriate policies and procedures and that financial risks are identified, measured and managed in accordance with the Company's poticies and risk objectives

#### Market risk

Market risk is the risk that the fair value of future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices. Market risk comprises three types of risk; currency risk, interest rate risk and other price risk, such as equity price risk and commodity risk. Financial instruments affected by market risk include loans and borrowings, deposits, FVTPL investments. Company is not affected by commodity risk and

The sensitivity analyses in the following sections relate to the position as at 31 March 2020 and 31 March 2019.

The sensitivity analyses have been prepared on the basis that the amount of net debt are all constant.

The analyses exclude the impact of movements in market variables on the carrying values of gratuity and other post-retirement obligations and provisions

The following assumptions have been made in calculating the sensitivity analysis:

The sensitivity of the relevant profit or loss item is the effect of the assumed changes in respective market risks.

This is based on the financial assets and financial liabilities held at 31 March 2020 and 31 March 2019.

Interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market interest rates. The Company's exposure to the risk of changes in market interest rates relates primarily to the Company's short-term debt obligations with Boating interest rates and loan advanced by Company to fellow subsidiaries and a body corporate.

#### ·Equity price risk

## Trade receivables

Customer credit risk is managed by the Company's established credit policy, procedures and control relating to customer credit risk management. Credit quality of a customer is assessed based on an extensive credit rating scorecard and individual credit limits are defined in accordance with this assessment and also based upon agreement/terms with respective customers. Outstanding customer receivables are regularly monitored.

An impairment analysis is performed at each reporting date on an individual basis for major clients, in addition, a large number of aunor receivables are grouped into homogenous groups and assessed for impairment collectively. The Company does not hold collateral as security. The Company evaluates the concentration of risk with respect to trade receivables as low, as its customers are located in several jurisdictions and industries and operate in largely independent markets.

# Financial instruments and cash deposits

Credit risk from balances with banks is managed in accordance with the Company's policy. Investments of surplus funds are made only with approved counterparties and within credit limits assigned to each counterparty. All investments are reviewed by the Company's board of directors on a quarterly basis. The limits are set to minimise the concentration of risks and therefore mitigate financial loss through counterparty's potential failure to make payments.



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### Liquidity risk

The Company monitors its risk of a shortage of funds using a liquidity planning tool.

The Company's objective is to maintain a balance between continuity of funding and flexibility through the use of bill discounting facility. The Company assessed the concentration of risk with respect to refinancing its debt and concluded it to be low. The Company has access to a sufficient variety of sources of funding and debt maturing within 12 months can be ralled over with existing lenders.

#### Excessive risk enneentration

Concentrations arise when a number of counterparties are engaged in similar business activities, or activities in the same geographical region, or have economic features that would cause their ability to meet contractual obligations to be similarly affected by changes in economic, political or other conditions. Concentrations indicate the relative sensitivity of the Company's performance to developments affecting a particular industry.

### Collatera

The Company has pledged part of its short-term deposits with banks as margin money against issuance of bank guarantees in order to fulfil the collateral requirements for its various contracts and for pre-paid instrument business. At 31 March 2020 and 31 March 2019, the fair values of the short-term deposits pledged were INR 43.18 Lakhs and INR 40.31 Lakhs respectively. The counterparties have an obligation to return the deposits to the Company upon settlement of the obligations under the contracts. There are no other significant terms and conditions associated with the use of collateral.

#### 43. Capital management

For the purpose of the Company's capital management, capital includes issued equity capital, share premium and all other equity reserves attributable to the equity holders of the parent. The primary objective of the Company's capital management is to maximise the shareholder value.

The Company manages its capital structure and makes adjustments in light of changes in economic conditions and the requirements of the linancial covenants. ### 48. Significant accounting judgéments, estimates and assumptions

The preparation of the Company's separate financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities, and the accompanying disclosures, and the disclosure of contingent liabilities. Uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that require a material adjustment to the carrying amount of assets or liabilities affected in future periods.

# A) Taxes

The Company recognizes MAT credit available as an asset only to the extent that there is convincing evidence that the Company respective companies in the Company which has reognized MAT credit will pay normal meome tax during the specified period i.e. the period for which MAT credit is allowed to be carried forward.

#### B) Defined benefit plans (gratnity benefits)

An actuarial valuation involves making various assumptions that may differ from actual developments in the future. These include the determination of the discount rate, future salary increases and mortality rates. Due to the complexities involved in the valuation and its long-term nature, a defined benefit obligation is highly sensitive to changes in these assumptions. All assumptions are reviewed at each reporting date

### C) Fair value areasurement of financial instruments

### D) Intaugible asset under development

The Company capitalises intangible asset under development for a project in accordance with the accounting policy. Initial capitalisation of costs is based on management's judgment that technological and economic feasibility is confirmed, usually when a product development project has reached a defined unilestone according to an established project management model. In determining the amounts to be capitalised, management makes assumptions regarding the expected future cash generation of the project, discount rates to be applied and the expected period of benefits.

### E) Useful fives of depreciable assets

The management estimates useful fives and estimated residual value of depreciable assets based on technical evaluation. These assumptions are reviewed at each reporting date.
